So What Exactly is LOSHRS?

Originally ran in the 2011 Guidebook and updated for the 2023 season

After 20+ years of happily cruising on Georgian Bay, it was time for a new lake and new challenge. Up until the move to Lake Ontario, we were racing if we were in front of someone and cruising if we were behind. We had a lot to learn. Decades of cruising and overnight anchoring had taught me the exceptional skill of how to keep your boat absolutely stationary for extended periods. Good to know for "cocktails" but not much help in racing. Ready for anything when we arrived at PCYC in 2004, one of the first race series we joined was LOSHRS.

Six years later, we have done it all. Besides LOSHRS, we have raced white-sail, spinnaker, one-design, PHRF, fully crewed, shorthanded, round-the-cans and long-distance and have enjoyed them all. But if I were forced to pick one series only, without hesitation it would be the LOSHRS. LOSHRS is the Lake Ontario Short Handed Race Series and it is comprised of 6 races of varying length and type throughout the summer. The Short Handed part of the race means you are either solo racing or at most double handed. In all the sailboat racing 1 have done, LOSHRS has been the most challenging and yet the least stressful, the most rewarding and without a doubt, the most fun. How can this be? What creates this kind of magic combination? First and foremost - it's the people. The series seems to be a magnet for exceptionally



remarkable human beings. Not every race series can boast this quality. Be prepared to make lifelong friends. Then there is the inclusiveness. As a PHRF-LO event, the LOSHRS is open to all boats whether cruising or racing design that meet the minimum length (20') and safety standards. As a result we have Crealock 34's racing alongside Schock 40's and J-24's racing alongside J-35's. Even though you are grouped into classes that have similar PHRF ratings, everyone is racing together toward the same finish line at the same time! This is not possible with most traditional regattas and it is a great treat to be part of a larger boat fleet charging across the lake together. Better yet, at the end of the race, you can compare your performance against all other boats in the fleet. It is not uncommon for the rocket ships in the fleet to be humbled by a well-sailed "white-sail" cruiser. Thirdly, there is the challenge. As a shorthanded racer, you must harness all the skills you previously learned on the racecourse with your full crew and now do them all yourself -

simultaneously. How hard can it be? Actually, not as hard as you might think. Unlike "round-the-cans" racing where a crack team of specialists are needed to skillfully complete the course and where a single split second mistake will cost you the race, the "point to point" racing in LOSHRS need only be as intense as you wish and is generally far more relaxed as you rarely find yourself in close-quarters with your competition. If you normally cruise with your spouse, you can race with her in LOSHRS and do very well and have fun doing it.

Lastly, there is the event itself. Depending on who you speak to, one person will describe LOSHRS as a cruise disguised as a race while another will describe it as a race disguised as a cruise. These are long distance races made up of a one-day events, a weekend events across



the lake and a 100 Miler overnight race. Each long enough to provide challenge and adventure but short enough to include a healthy dose of pre- and post-race socializing with good friends. The skills exhibited on the water are regularly outdone by the culinary delights, which appear out of nowhere when the racing has ended and the re-cap, bragging and trash-talk begins.

The 'yarns' told on shore clearly prove that 'embellishment' is not a lost art. In my book, there is no better combination of challenge, good fun and camaraderie to be had on the lake, all the while enjoying the pure pleasure of sailing at it's very best. Add a very gratifying sense of personal accomplishment and a very real increase in your sailing skills and confidence and you have an unbeatable combination.

Offshore Racing - Is It For You?



What's the appeal of distance racing, anyway?

As not only a supporter and organizer but as a competitor in the new race to Kingston and Ambassador & competitor in Lake Ontario Offshore Racing events.

There's something special about distance racing, it has an allure that brings so many back time and time again, so let me explain why a distance race should be next on your list of adventures.

Whether you are an around the mark's day or evening racer, pleasure sailor or cruiser type, it's worth your effort to try a distance race, whether it's a medium distance race during daylight, an overnight or multiple day and night circumnavigation. Upon completion, you will very likely want more. I say this because the vast majority that completes their first distance race return year after year- it becomes the lure of the experience, as every distance race you complete is not only an adventure, no single race is the same in either the experience or obstacles and challenges or success encountered. It's a lot about the camaraderie shared while working with others towards a common goal, the team experience and how collectively challenges are overcome.

Just completing a distance race can be a significant accomplishment a podium finish position is an added opportunity to celebrate. Each race is a badge of honour of a special achievement personally but also for the team of individuals you experienced it with. Is distance racing character-

Every time I start a distance or offshore race, I am reinvigorated as there is no place like offshore on a sailboat, being immersed in the elements, the character and skill-building situations you find yourself in and those lifelong memories created with your crew- distance racing provides all of these. The pictures I have included illustrate memories that will last a lifetime, with family, crew and other club close friends I have experienced distance races with some that were textbook others more precarious as to challenges that needed to be overcome.

If you have not done a distance race, I encourage you to put one into your summer calendar, whether it's a one-day LOSHER race to ports of destination, the 100 miler, or the overnight experience of the Susan Hood Trophy race or Race to Kingston overnight to the best destination area on the lake, or the ultimate lake distance race the Ontario 300. You will have accomplished something that many are not able to experience.

We are working toward being GOLD Level ready for 2023. Are you? Because we need your support.












A Brief History of the Susan Hood Trophy Race

In the spring of 1955, Doug Hood, a member of the Port Credit Yacht Club, approached George Cuthbertson (the big George of C&C) and offered to put up a trophy if someone would produce a simple measurement system for handicapping custom-built yachts. Big George told Doug of the "Gruthbertson" Rule that he and Colonel Grant had designed and that had been tried in Kingston. (Col. Grant was a professor at RMC and very active in sailing). Under this Rule, the yacht was measured in the water and not weighed. They decided to try it out with Doug donating the trophy named after his brand new bouncing baby





daughter Susan. Approximately 25 boats were measured and the first race was held in early June. The course was Port Credit to Oakville to Port Dalhousie and back to Port Credit. In spite of a fire on one yacht, very little wind, and Doug winning his own trophy (in a Cruising 6 Metre "Junge"), the race was a great success.

The rule became known as the Lake Ontario Rule and an organization was formed to issue rating certificates. For the next 35 years LOR was the most popular handicap system on the lake until it was replaced by PHRF, a handicap system that in most cases only requires the measurement of sails.

Today, the Susan Hood Trophy is presented to the yacht-winning PHRF overall, with other trophies for the division winners. It

is believed that this is the only case where the title trophy is not awarded to the winner of the "Grand Prix" class (CCA, IOR, and now IMS), although there are trophies for those divisions as well.

Suddenly Alone

Carolyn Burgess, The Rigging Shoppe

Think about a time onboard your vessel when something went very wrong, and you were afraid. What generated the fear? It is likely that you were not in control of your environment, and you didn't know what action to take. Take this feeling and use it as your motivation to become better prepared. Over boarding can be a life-threatening event because you quickly lose sight of the person in the water. It can take as few as 2 waves to lose sight of them. Threats to life include drowning, heart attack, cold water shock and/or secondary drowning. Do you have a plan? When you do, practice it frequently.

Ensure you are prepared to call a Mayday and/or send a DSC Distress signal from your VHF. Confirm your VHF is correctly connected to your chart plotter and that you have registered your MMSI number with the Canadian government. This will ensure that Canadian Search and Rescue (SAR) technicians will have a description of your boat when an electronic DCS Distress signal is sent by pressing the red button on your VHF radio.

Staying on the boat is the best plan for returning to the dock safely. If you do become separated from your vessel an electronic locating device can provide a vital role in your recovery by SAR and/or nearby vessels. Electronic MOB devices like the Ocean Signal MOB1 use AIS transmission to automatically communicate with the vessel you have been separated from and other marine traffic in the vicinity (up to 5 miles range dependent on conditions). Your best chance of rapid rescue if you fall overboard comes from your own vessel. Your crew needs to be immediately aware of the incident and keep track of your position whilst recovery is carried out.



The ACR OLAS Tag is a Wearable Crew Tracker that integrates OLAS (Overboard Location Alert System) technology. The ACR OLAS mobile application technology detects a break in its 'virtual tether' to the tag within 8 seconds of a Tag going missing. The mobile phone(s) then sounds an alarm and records the latitude and longitude of the incident using the phone or tablet's GPS. ACR OLAS then aids the crew with the MOB recovery, clearly directing them to the GPS location where the MOB occurred with clear visual signals and bearing data.

Personal Locator Beacons (PLB) provide the reassurance that global emergency services can be alerted by manually pressing a button. PLB's operate on the global Cospas Sarsat rescue system a satellitebased distress-alerting system. Using satellites, the system detects, locates and distributes aircraft, maritime and personal distress alerts to over 200 SAR coordination centres and points of contact around the world. PLB may take longer than an AIS transmission to alert SAR of your emergency however once turned on this device reliably delivers your distress signal from any location providing the antenna has a clear path to the sky.

What does the future hold? PLB's with AIS are devices which will merge 406 MHz and AIS distress messaging effectively pairing both global and local rescue, thereby maximizing access to the most effective rescue resources available. Manufacturers like ACR and Ocean Signal have not confirmed when these devices will become available to the Canadian market.

"Hope for the best and be prepared for the worst" is a quote by Maya Angelou. I encourage you to consider your preparedness for your next sailing adventure.

LO300/600 -Double the Challenge

Have you kicked yourself for not being part of the Lake Ontario 600 Challenges? Do you now believe that the Lake Ontario 600 is a challenge that can be won whether you're sailing solo, double-handed, or fully crewed? Have you heard the stories of adventure from the yachts that have finished the 2014, 2016, 2018, and 2020 races, and wished you could have been there? Then, the chance to be a part of this Great Challenge is once again upon us, as the Lake Ontario Offshore Racing (LOOR) Committee is proud to announce the running of the Bi-Annual Lake Ontario 600 Challenge, beginning Saturday, July 15th, 2023, at the Port Credit Yacht Club.

As part of the 25th Annual Lake Ontario 300 Challenge in 2014, LOOR announced the inaugural Lake Ontario 600 Challenge, to be run in the true spirit of the first running of the race, back in 1990. We promised that if it was a success, we would make it a Bi-Annual event, and run it in conjunction with the Lake Ontario 300 Challenge. Originally held on all even years, the LO600 was moved to odd years due to all races being cancelled in 2021 due to COVID. The results are in, and now, after successful challenges in all years, the Lake Ontario 600 is firmly entrenched in the calendars of Great Lakes Sailors everywhere. The rules are quite simple: To compete in the Challenge, yachts must first be eligible and plan to sail the Main Duck Island Course (MDI) of the LO300 Challenge. Secondly, competing skippers must have already completed



at least one Lake Ontario 300 Race on the MDI Course as a skipper in the past. The only exception to this ruling is for Solo Sailors who are members of the GLSS, whereby the 26 current Lake Ontario members AND all GLSS members from any of the other four lakes are automatically eligible to compete. Third, yachts that wish to compete in the LO600 Challenge must have a PHRF Rating of 180 or faster.

In 2014, the organizing committee wanted to keep this Challenge as simple as possible, and it worked out very well for all competitors. When signing up for the LO300 Main Duck Course, simply indicate that you are also signing up for the LO600, submit your PHRF Rating, and pay the extra \$100.00 fee for this race. All Yachts competing will be lumped



into one division for the second lap of the lake. Therefore, whether you are sailing the LO300 as PHRF or IRC, and whether you are sailing the LO300 as a fully crewed, doublehanded, or solo boat, it makes no difference. You sail your Lake Ontario 300 Race in the division of your choosing, and upon crossing the first finish

line, and beginning the second, identical lap of the lake, all boats are then lumped into one LO600 PHRF Division, and all will compete on an even playing field.

Your rating and time from the LO300 are used in the LO600 as the first half of the race. Even if you do not complete the second lap of the race, your LO300 time and finish will not be affected. When we began this process, there were a few naysayers. As part of our belief that the race would be a success, the Hughes family (FBYC) offered to donate the trophy for the 1st Place Overall Winner of the Challenge. We were excited to choose a great piece of World War II Canadian Naval heritage, as well as a Hughes Family heirloom, as the trophy. We offered to name it after the first winning yacht of the race, and we are proud to say that The Pearl

Trophy now graces the Chartroom of the Port Credit Yacht Club. We have been told on numerous occasions, that this is one of the nicest trophies that is now housed at PCYC, and it is what you will be competing for in 2023.

So... what are you waiting for? You know you want to try this in 2023! Sign up for the LO600, and start planning your crew, your food, your route, and your strategy for this year's running.

Be a part of something special.

Sail the Lake Ontario 600 Challenge on July 15, 2023!



Sailing It Forward

Diversity, Equity and Inclusion on the Water

Marguerite Pyron

In 1998, a handful of sailors formed a charity, called the Broad Reach Foundation for Youth Leaders, to increase access to sailing in the Toronto.

With only one boat, they were determined to change the complexion of the sailing community in an innovative way: reaching out and engaging disadvantaged youth who had never had the opportunity to step aboard a sailboat nor would they even dream of it!

Why Were We Needed in 1998?

Because society was more open to understanding the many barriers that prevent what was then called Youth at risk from experiencing the sport, science and adventure of sailing, and from the benefits and values of sailing - benefits and values that can shape and enrich a lifetime.

The first barrier is economic. So, for almost 25 years, Broad Reach has provided its Summer Afloat Programming absolutely free of charge. We remain the only sailing-based charity in Canada whose programming is free for everyone who participates.

Whom Do We Support in 2023?

In 2023, increasing diversity, equity, and inclusion remains at the heart of Broad Reach. Our program participants are recommended by 40+ social agencies that support under-served, BIPOC and LGBTQ+ youth ages 12-

30. These young people - or their parents - arrived in Canada from the Middle East, Pakistan, the Horn of Africa, Afghanistan, India and pretty much any other country of origin. We established positive partnerships with Indigenous service providers and 60% of our participants selfidentify as female.



Many of the young people are in difficult circumstances: on the street, in conflict with the law, living in homeless shelters, experiencing intergenerational tensions, or the challenges of physical and mental health. And everyone is welcome, and everyone is given the opportunity to discover skills which they never knew they had, or to start on a new path toward a new horizon, which they never knew was possible.

And, just as our participants celebrate diversity, equity, and inclusion, our leadership team also demonstrates those principles. Our current President of the Board, Charles Duncan Waterman, is a dedicated sailor who brought his talents to Toronto from Barbados. He is the first Black President of any sailing-based organization in Canada, and he leads a Board whose volunteers include women and men from diverse cultures.

How Far has Broad Reach Grown?

Today, our Mission and Vision remain the same, but our new trading name - Broad Reach Canada - reflects our larger impact, reach and value. We are honoured by Sail Canada's Best 2020 Program Award and the Government of Canada 2021 Social Innovation Award in Ontario. Since 2017, our digital and hands-on programming has expanded to include 7,000 participants on the East Coast, on the St. Lawrence, on the



Great Lakes, and on the Pacific Coast. We now have 7 vessels in Toronto, and partner with 7 Canadian tall ship organizations in Victoria, Hamilton, Kingston, Montreal and Lunenburg. In 2021, our Sailing Access Fund provided bursary support for 150 young people to train on these tall ships and some returned as crew and employees.


